of the world. Ihe population of Winnipeg tolay is 235,000 of the
souls.

The story of Winnipeg is one of the most marvelous and impressive records of growth on the continent. Forty ycirs ago Winnipegs population was less than 500 and the sclool attend-
ance was forly-five pupils; it was but a post of tue Hudson ance was forly-five pupils; it was but a post of the Hudson
Bay Company without churches, streets or railroads, and buta few years previousty the Indians shased lerds of buffalo across the prairic where the city now stands. It is now the railroai and business center of the Canadian West. Twenty-seven rail-
way tracks radiate from it, and the C. P. R yard here with way tracks radiate from it, and the C. P. R. yards here, wi
its 13 miles of sidings, is the largest in the world a single corporation.
Wimipeg is the chicf central point of the Canadian Northe and Grand Trumk Pacific Railway systems-these roads having
huilt a Union Snation built a Union Station at a cost of $\$ 1,500,000$, and the magnificent
nev Fort Garry hotec costigg iout nev Fort Garry lotel costing about two million dollars.
Winnipeg is in the famous Red River Valley and surrounded ly good farming, timber and mining districts, with extensive
lake fisheries. The strects of the city are senerally wid the principal avenue being $132 \mathrm{fect}$, with 168 miles of streets paved with asphalt, block and macadam. The area of 15,138 acres has been covered by 246 miles of severs, 417 miles of pavel and graded strects-120 miles of which are boulcevarded
and 490 miles of sidewalks min mins of sidevalks.

177.237. The electric strect rail miles of city tracks and 45 miles of surturbian lines.
