If you don't feel that your club officers are doing enough to get new members involved let the Board of Directors know, and I'm sure you will see results.

I would ask every member in Hoo-Hoo this year to offer your services to the Board of Directors, to serve on a membership committee or any project your club may need you on. Even more important, don't take any job if you haven't got the time or desire to do a good job. If you are a club officer, on the Board or a committee, we urge you to do your very best. If for any number of reasons you can't do your best, please ask your president to replace you with someone who has the time and energy to do a great job. Everyone will think more of you because of it and Hoo-Hoo throughout the world will grow and prosper again.





We will be requesting Clubs to give them sufficient time for the word of Hoo-Hoo to be spread. To those Past Supreme 9's I offer my thanks.



Please keep me informed on your club functions for the balance of the year and I will make as many visits as physically possible.






December 12 We returned home in time to attend our own company Christmas Party. It is great to be home again and am looking forward to visiting most of the clubs in J-6 in mid-January.









HOO-HOO JURISDICTION IV Guidelines for Media Contact and Editorial Copy

Guidelines for Media Contact: 1. Obtain a list of local media organisations.

2. Obtain names of responsible persons and reporters.

3. Find out deadlines for copy. 4. Make out a personalised list of contact names, media organisations, phone numbers, addresses and deadlines.

5. Try to meet the more important media people, invite them to Hoo-Hoo functions, perhaps arrange a "get-to-know-you evening".

6. Learn what they require in copy format, what they are interested in or what they believe is the public interest. Let them tell you how to prepare a news release.

7. When sending news releases to several local media, time the release so all of them get a fair go at fresh news yet are in time for their deadlines. For instance, the newspaper might not come out over a weekend - don't release the news at Friday lunch time if you want paper cover if radio and TV have a couple of days advance notice.

Guidelines for Editorial Copy: 1. News items must actually be newsworthy.

2. Press releases should be short and precise but accompanied by photos and supporting matter.

3. Always provide a call-back reference to the article, eg, name of PR officer, address, phone number. 4. Send all releases to SPLATT

as a matter of course and special ones to HHI Log & Tally.

5. Make sure facts are correct, names and initials are right, you have the right date and time.

6. If possible, have them typed clearly, double spaced if for radio and TV.

7. Use easy to read words. Use precise short sentences and short punchy paragraphs. Study the papers to learn their style.

8. Notice of coming events are written differently to publicity of events which have been held. Don't have over repetition between before and after publicity.

9. Keep a file of your news releases and of any successful written publicity.

the forest industries. (c) The ideal of 50 percent

(d) We should utilize the resources of the existing forest industry publications.

(e) We need to promote functions of an industry based nature eg help promote the timber subfloor program to merchants and specifiers.

(f) We need to promote the industry and Hoo-Hoo to the general public and tell them about our programs eg Gottstein, World Forestry Day, Bushfire Appeal, Moomba, etc.

(g) We need to promote Hoo-Hoo to our own industry.

(h) The original concept of a Watchdog Committee could be revitalised and incorporated within the Media function.

(i) Every club should have a media committee.

(j) J4 can itself be a catalyst in developing an awareness of this need and in activating media attention. For instance, J4 media releases to clubs could be prepared eg Gottstein, Bushfire Fund and other J4 initiatives which give an overall picture of Australian success.

Specific Thoughts and Recognitions:

1. We recognise the need to provide worthwhile copy to the media. The news must be newsworthy.

2. The committee recognises that collectively, the order is involved in many worthwhile projects of industry, civic or just personal value and newsworth. Gottstein, the Bushfire Appeal, Timber Weeks, World Forestry Day events, Awards to students, charitable events etc. Hoo-Hoo is a newsworthy body.

3. The committee also recognises however that collectively, we have not utilized these media assets to their full potential. Clubs and J4 need to be more active in regard to the media. For instance, J4 could (Continued on Next Page)

prepare media release to help clubs, eg, updates on Bushfire Appeal, contribution to Gotstein, Snark's visit. Clubs could provide media releases to other clubs on important events. Clubs could ensure their own events are put actively to the media. These must be done at the time while the news is hot.

4. We recognise the need to prepare copy properly. Full details and work input are required. Copy that is well prepared, 100 percent prepared or at least 80 percent prepared has a 50 percent chance of acceptance. To this end, the subcommittee has prepared guidelines for editorial copy. These are attached.

5. Having prepared copy, we recognise the problem in delivering it. Who is the media? What are contact points? What are the publication deadlines? To this end, the subcommittee will prepare a list or directory of media contact sourcing some of the following

(a) Industry, eg, AFIJ, Aust Timberman, Victorian Timber News (b) NZ

(c) Selections from Country Press Index

(d) Company magazines, eg, Stihl

(e) Associated industries, eg, furniture guilds, SA Builder

and providing contact names, addresses and deadlines.

6. We recognise the difficulties of attracting the attention of national or capital city press. Smaller towns are much easier. We must be prepared to be

(a) Persistant, try, try, try.

(b) Use PR personnel to include Hoo-Hoo content in their news release eg Timber Talk in Adelaide's Sunday Mail.

(c) Build our image in the friendly trade press and use this as a base to get into the press and other media.

(d) To work on our lack of media identity.

(e) To try and meet media representatives. Invite them to functions. Find out what they want in the way of copy, what they are interested in the timing of copy and supporting information.

7. As part of the Media Improvement program, the old idea of a Watchdog Committee was raised not only to communicate media or other actions within Hoo-Hoo but to communicate to the media and promote the industry by eye-ball to eye-ball contact, ie, talk to TAFES, schools, service clubs. Every club should have the Watchdog role as part of its objectives and should provide vital activity in this area.

8. Resource Material is required by clubs. We suggest approaches to Associations such as RPAA, TDA, PAA to provide resource material, a few examples are

Establishment of softwood planations

Tasmanian hardwood resource TPC concrete floor activity

Engineering design in wood Innovative use of panel products The importance of the industry to the nation

Economics of wood compared with competitor products

Wood preservations extending the role of wood products

and this information should be available in modern media form such as videos, canned slides formats, etc.

9. We need to develop a capable group of Hoo-Hoo and Timber Industry identities at a club and national level. These identities should be capable of delivering meaningful addresses to public bodies (TAFES, schools, service clubs) using their own material and the above "canned" information.

10. We need to promote the availability of these seminar and after dinner speakers and to use them as referral points and contacts to handle any difficulty issue.

11. The Media Committee saw SPLATT as an image building tool within our industry. We suggest a wider circulation to the industry and friendly press and to potential advertisers. Wider circulation could help it be more self supporting (advertising).

12. Every club should have a Media or Publicity Director. He should head a subcommittee of helpers or at least an assistant. This Director should report regularly to club and club executive meetings and involve members in media ideas and activities. The watchdog concept is part of this directors portfolio. The section "ideals or objectives" under answers 2 is a basic philosophy for this committee.

In Conclusion:

We found it difficult not to stray into the areas of other committees but so many areas overlap, eg, Media-SPLATT, Media and Image-Membership, etc. We believe the suggestions in this report are worthwhile and if adopted in part or totally by J4 and individual clubs can only be of positive benefit to Hoo-Hoo. The new taxation practices do imply that Hoo-Hoo should be more business like and identifiable as a business activity or else, companies and taxation authorities will not accept us, will not support us and the order will die. Consequently, the Media-Promotions function does become a major development area for Hoo-Hoo. We hope clubs and J4 find this treatise helpful in setting their Media-Promotions objectives and that the various comments and guidelines are useful in putting this program into practical effect, eg, how to do it. If clubs can improve their media effort and effect then, the proposed media award at next convention will become as important and as valuable as any of our awards.




