Louls is a beautiful city, Chicago is a benutfirul elty, and there are other cities far ahead of Little rock in ome respects, but, my dear brothers, we are growing; tho time is coming when Arkansas and tho South will be the center of the lumber Industry of the entire North American ton of lumbermen, in a place where it would be far distant rom the center of this great Industry? The State of Arkansas is the mother of thts great order, and no matter how many bettor States there may be, or how many places there may be better for us to go to than to Arkansas, vo where tts mother olves Arkassas to go back home and o Arkansas and establish permanent we ought to go say to yoll to consider Lillle Rock as the best city for uch a purpose. I will tako the time to read to you com. munleatlons from a arge number of Hoo-Hoo in the State Arkansas, from the Governor and many prominent elttens of the State-Invitations to Hoo.Hoo to come to Little your entire memberslip are located to that two firths of he respect to the North the East and tho West: wo now that the timber of Michigan and the great Northwest as heen pretty well cut out. With all due respect toward Arkansas, there is ne thing that we have got to take into consideration In considering the question of permanent headquarters. In making this selection the advisability of selecting a point that the Supreme Nino can get to convenlently must be considered. Now, the membership of thlls body covers the entire country. If you locate the headnuarters at a
point that is not advantugeous and convenlent, you will cente an addiditonal expense. Now, from a business point $f$ view, a locution that is not contral is detrlmental. You cannot get ovor that fact. It is true that Arkansas is the nother of Hoo-Hoo, but to establish our permaennt headuarters, even in Arkansas or in Tennessee or in North Caroilina or away up in Michlgan or Canada, would not plek this point, remember that you must golect a point that Is geographically so situated that each membor of the Nine can reach it whenever necessary, at the lonst expense, in the quickest time. I might suggest the Clity of Chicago, butt I would not want to go on record as makling a clalm for Clicengo, if there is any other point Supreme Nino I have attended these meotings, and I have heard others who were on the Supremo Nine spoak on thls subject, and they have all sald, when they wante to call a meeting, that they preferred Cllcango.
