dates would be from nearby places, as no one would want to come any great distance, when there was a chance of his belng rejected. The attendance at the annuals is usually but a small portion of the membership, and that

the Elks and other orders. The method of obtaining admission to a concatenation is too lax. The card would in a manner remedy this. Some may ask, What is the matter with the button? A good deal. I have seen men wearing
