A Tardy Explanation.

In the September issue of the Bulletin, in the report of the annual meeting, appeared the following bracketed comment by the editor on the discussion of the eligibility clause:

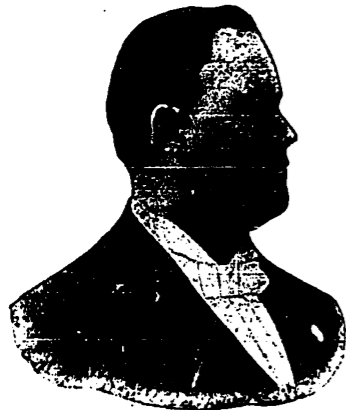
The discussion just here, as reported by the official stenographer, is exceedingly confusing. The fourth clause, as reported by the committee, contains no "contrivances" to be stricken out. What No. 2351 wanted, probably, was the addition of something like this to the clause as reported by the committee: "And mechanical appliances for such machinery." This would make the fourth clause read: "Sawmill machinery men; by this term being meant persons engaged in manufacturing sawmill or planing mill machinery, and mechanical appliances for such machinery."—Editor Bulletin.

To the casual reader this comment would probably appear as a reflection or an implied stricture on the accuracy of Mr. M. M. Marsh, who took the stenographic report of the meeting. The purpose of this article, which will be given a prominent place in the Bulletin, is to wholly and emphatically disavow any such interpretation. The comment was made wholly with a view to making clear an important part of the discussion at the Annual, and the editor of the Bulletin takes a great deal of pleasure in saying that Mr. Marsh's report of the proceedings of the annual meeting was the best piece of stenographic work he ever saw. Any confusion that might possibly appear in it was due to its very accuracy. He not only caught correctly the verbatim discussion, despite the, at times, very great confusion in the hall, but put in practically every word that was said, even when there were two or three men talking at once.

The Bulletin takes pleasure in making this explanation, which is due Mr. Marsh, and in adding its testimony to his splendid work.

This article was written for the October Bulletin, as soon as the editor's attention was called to the probable interpretation of the comment, but in his absence it was crowded out.

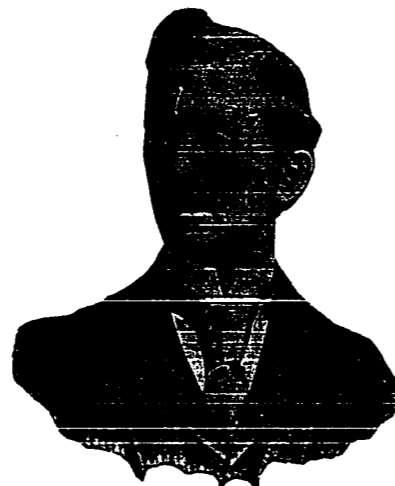

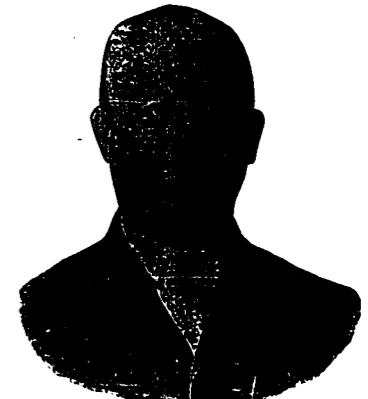

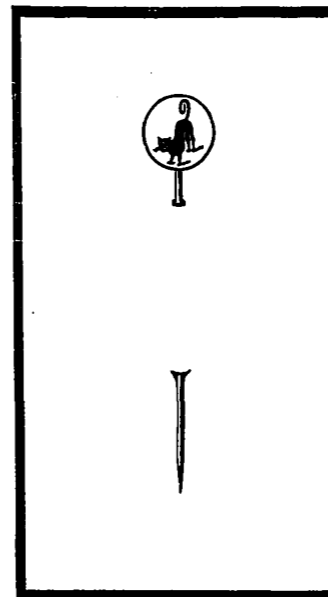

Death of R. S. Boney.

The immediate cause of death was cerebro-spinal meningitis, though Mr. Boney had been in poor health for some time. He died at home, surrounded by his wife and small children.

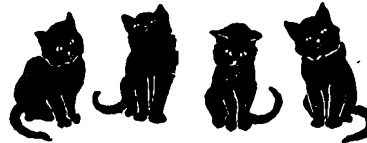
Kentucky.
