The thing has worked out splendidy. It has carried a lighted andle of hone into many a darkened homo to my nol onal knowledge. We have paid durlng the past yen hirly-two death clalms and have two pending lavestiga tion. I have 100 letters written by good men all over or good rensons, showing an Intorest in this work, and those lettors ought to be read here. The men who have sone to the trouble to respond to our invitation to write pon this subject certainly ought to be shown the courtesy having their letters considered; but wo have so many ther things to distract our attention we may not havo mo for this. I regret to say there is a number of mon ho seek to take advantare of this thing in a perpectly legitimate way. They are not resorting to any fravid but they go on and pay no attention to our olforts to advertise it and extend aid to some fellow who, perhaps,

Not a great many of our members realize that the concatenated Order of Hoo-Hoo has one member who would not take offense it referred to as no gentleman. In the arly days of the organization, and before there was Incor porated into the constitution the provision that member
ship be confined strictly thip be confined strictly to men over twenty-one, ther
ccorred a lumber convention and a concatenation at Memphis, Tenn, on which occasion, the ceremonies being somewhat modified, a lady was duly initiated.
The fact that there is a woman member in the great Order of H 00 -Hoo is not so muci a matter of wonder and speculation, as was the early life of this woman Hoo-Hoo, entering as she did into the business world at a time when woman and commercialism were but strangers.
The Hoo-Hco in question is No . 2877, and her name is Mrs. M. A. Smith, who was born at Somerville, Tenn. It was in the state of her birth that Mrs. Smita became a member of Hoo-Hoo in 1592 at Memphis, and it was but a few nilles from the spot where Hoo-Hoo was organizedGurdon, Arkansas, to which her parents early emigrated,
setling in Clark Counts; where the little hamlet of "Smit" ton" sprang into existence.
Mrs. Smith knew early in life hardship and suffering. for her childhood was that of the war period, as was ter young girlhood that of the reconstruction time. But no

period, no matter how rife with struggle, hardship, and uffering, is without its romance, so in time young Mary Corman met and came to marry James Allen Smith-one of the pioneer names of Arkansas. Mr. Smith died January
