




LEADERS IN LUMBER

The Legacy of Barney Wagner

Leaders in Lumber is a special feature in Log & Tally meant to celebrate groundbreaking individuals who made a difference in the lumber industry.



After graduating from high school in 1965, he entered the U.S. Navy at 18 and spent an extended tour in Vietnam aboard a small combat ship in the Tonkin Gulf. He was honorably discharged in 1969. Barney resumed his career in the lumber business with the same lumberyard as he was promised a job upon returning home.

In the early 1970's, Barney joined Al Meier and became part of a start-up with a new lumberyard called South Hill Lumber. After many years, Barney and Al became partners in one of the new yards that would eventually become Al Meier's Building Centers, which had 6 yards in the Pacific Northwest. In 1991, we sold Al Meier's Building Centers to Lumbermen's Building Centers. Barney contin-



ued with Lumbermen's as director of operations. After 5-½ years with Lumbermen's Building Centers, it was time to move on. Barney developed a great reputation with vendors, customers and contractors. He realized what the people of rural Western Washington needed and in 1997, after 30 years in the lumber and building material industry, he had a vision.

The ideology of Arrow Lumber & Hardware was founded on legendary customer service along with honesty, integrity and commitment. In March, 1997, Arrow Lumber & Hardware started in a small field in Puyallup, WA. The crew consisted of only two men with Al Meier as a partner. Both Al and Barney put in matching funds for the start-up. Barney and his protégé, Shawn Roehr, who was only 16 when Barney introduced him to the lumber business, founded Arrow Lumber & Hardware. Barney was impressed with Shawn's eagerness to learn and drive to succeed. The two worked 16-hour days, purchasing, selling and delivering, and soon the business began to grow. In June of 1997, Arrow Lumber & Hardware purchased the complete operation of Inter-Mountain Building Materials in Eatonville, WA. This would be their first official store location

which is still in operation today.

About two years later, Barney, Shawn, and Al went on to pursue development of their next location in Buckley, WA. After Barney, Shawn and Al had completed the plans, construction commenced in the spring of 1998. This project was Arrow Lumber's flagship location and would be their second independently owned and operated store. The location would also become the Corporate office for the business. The Buckley location officially opened for business on August 6, 1999.

Nearly a month later, an opportunity became available for a third location in the town of Port Orchard, WA. The three then purchased and accepted ownership of Bethel Builders Home Center. As previously planned, Barney purchased all the assets from Al Meier and became the sole owner. Shortly after, Shawn Roehr became partner in all business operations.

In keeping with rural focus, Arrow Lumber & Hardware chose Randle, WA., as their next location. This location would be their fourth independently owned and operated store. The Randle location opened for business in April 2004.

Photos and documents relating to the area have been donated and collated and it's become the repository of several historic buildings that have been restored and house several collections.

What better place to house the new Hoo-Hoo Room, which has our motto "Health, Happiness and Long Life," the Hoo-Hoo logo emblazoned along with the Star of Hoo-Hoo painted over the doors leading up to it. It's the place to visit next time you're in New Zealand.

seeing you both in September!



By then, Barney and Shawn had found a strong market in establishing full-service lumber yards for the "under-served" rural areas of Western Washington.

Shawn's outstanding work ethic earned him the position of vice president and general manager and shortly after in 2005, he was named president and co-owner of Arrow Lumber & Hardware.

In July 2006, Barney and Shawn would soon capitalize on a new opportunity presented to them: The purchase of Logan Lumber Company in Orting, WA. The location had been serving the surrounding community for 10 years prior to Arrow Lumber's acquisition. In July 2006, the Orting location became their fifth independently owned and operated store in Western Washington.

In 2007, Arrow Lumber & Hardware was ready to celebrate its 10th Anniversary. The milestone for Barney, Shawn and their veteran staff of professionals marked significant progression towards servicing these rural communities by supporting local schools, community events, food banks and customers. Main-

taining the ability to support and give back within the communities they serve is one of Arrow Lumber's core values.

In January of 2008, commercial property was purchased in Port Townsend, WA., as Arrow Lumber & Hardware's sixth location. Development of the commercial property was underway six months after the purchase of the land. The Port Townsend location initially operated out of a small portable building on site with limited space for retail hardware and lumber storage. In 2009, the grueling process of obtaining building permits began. It wasn't until 2014 that Arrow Lumber was given the green light to begin construction for their newest location. Arrow Lumber & Hardware finally opened the doors to the new store as well as hosted an official grand opening in June 2015. Shawn was promoted to President and CEO in 2014.

After celebrating its 20th anniversary in 2017, the hunt continued for more opportunities for Arrow Lumber & Hardware. In 2018, Barney and Shawn purchased Levee Lumber's operation in Ocean Shores, keeping the focus on under-served markets in Western WA.


