


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

"Well, I don't rightly know, I better go ask Jeb" says Jethro and yet again walks the 10 miles to the hills and back to town.


Upon returning Jethro says to the yardman, "Jeb says you better give 'em to us for a while . . . we're gonna build a barn."


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PAUL BUNYAN MEETS HOO-HOO

The mythical Paul Bunyan is unique in that he was not created from the legends of a person that once lived. The stories of Casey Jones, Davy Crocket, John Henry, Johnny Appleseed, Black Bart, and others were based on an actual person. The legend of Paul Bunyan is believed to have originated in Maine (Canadians claim Nova Scotia). Paul was born a very large baby – it took five storks to deliver him. In spite of his size and strength, Paul was very quick. He would blow the candle out at night and be in bed before it was dark.

Paul started his career in the woods of New England and the tales of his superhuman abilities followed him as he made his way to the Great Lakes, Upper Midwest, South as far as Florida and West to Arizona and California, then to Oregon and Washington in the Northwest. Statutes memorializing Paul and Babe the Blue Ox are located in all of these territories. Libraries in universities across the land including the Universities of Oregon, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Washington, and Reed College in Portland have diverse collections of material containing numerous books and writings of Paul Bunyan's adventures. The mythical character, Superman, was not created until 1938, so Paul Bunyan could be known as the first "Superman".





According to the 1980 book RED RIVER by Robert M Hanft, the very first appearance of the name Paul Bunyan in print seems to have been in 1910, in the Detroit News Tribune. The June 24 issue printed the story titled "The Round River Drive" as a part of a continuing feature known as "The Deacon Seat Tales". The printed record of Paul Bunyan is silent for four more years, then it appeared twice. A version of "The Round River Drive" was repeated in the "American Lumberman". The other appearance was in Bill Laughead's booklet "Introducing Mr. Paul Bunyan of Westwood, California".

William B. Laughead, an independent adman, and a Cousin of the Walkers, owners of Red River Lumber Company (RRLC), was the first to utilize Paul Bunyan for commercial use in a series of campaigns for the Westwood, Lassen County, California sawmill. Laughead had a flair for words and the ability to dream up ideas and created supporting characters for Paul. One was Johnny Inkslinger, Paul's bookkeeper, who filled the ledgers so rapidly that his pen had to be connected directly to a keg of ink with a tube. It was reported that Johnny could save 9 gallons of ink a month by not dotting the I's or crossing the T's. Johnny Inkslinger appears below in "The Round River Drive."

Boasting of its size, the RRLC sawmill situated between the Sierra and Cascade Mountains with its three bandmill headrigs was the

largest pine sawmill in the west until Weyerhaeuser built its four bandmill headrig sawmills in Klamath Falls, Oregon in 1929. Tales about Paul Bunyan appeared and the campaign gradually gained momentum. Embellishing older exploits and adding some of his own, Laughhead created the first pictorial representation of Paul Bunyan. The RRLC campaign ingrained Paul Bunyan as a nationally recognized figure, and it also affirmed his massive marketing appeal. Throughout the better part of the century, Paul Bunyan's name and image continued to be utilized in promoting various products, cities, and services. Across North America, giant statues of Paul Bunyan were erected to promote local businesses and tourism. An article on Paul Bunyan appeared in the December 1924 Hoo-Hoo Bulletin regarding his advertising for the RRLC. The next year, in 1925 Hoo-Hoo Club #38 was formed in Westwood, California being one of three clubs formed in as many days. February 9, California, February 10, Susanville, Westwood, California. February 11 Club # 40 in Reno, Nevada. A week later, on February 18, 1925, East Bay Club #39 was formed in Oakland, California. One member of the Walker family was elected to the Westwood Club's board of directors as well as Bill Laughead. On a visit to Westwood, it was reported that Paul Bunyan left Minnesota on snowshoes in such a hurry that his left snowshoe melted, causing him to veer left ending up in San Francisco that same day.

PAUL BUNYAN MEETS HOO-HOO

The extra 200 miles to backtrack to Westwood, made Paul arrive after dark that night. During an earlier visit to California in May of 1915 by Paul, it was thought that Mt. Lassen had erupted, but it was actually Paul's cook, Sour Dough Sam who forgot to take his 500-gallon pot of beans off the fire pit at the foot of Mt. Lassen. When Paul Bunyan got acquainted with Hoo-Hoo he modified modus operandi to incorporate Hoo-Hoo's affinity for the number nine. This is illustrated in the text that accompanied the RRLC's ad in the December 1924 Hoo-Hoo Bulletin as follows: The year of the Nine-month Winter (which was 9 years after he logged off North Dakota in 9 weeks with 9 men) Paul Bunyan had a contract to land 99 million feet of logs scattered over 9 townships up to the 9th fork of Nine Mile Creek. Headquarters Camp 9 was 9 days trip for the 9-horse horse tote teams and so deep in the woods that the owls mated with the chickens and the roosters used to crow "Hoo-Hoo." When the wolves got to be a nuisance Paul was on the point of killing all his poultry when a bright idea struck him. "Nina" his Big Black Cat, had exterminated all the rats and was getting fat and lazy with nothing to do and licking up 9 gallons of cream a day so Paul taught Nina to yowl and when the wolves "Hoo-Hoo" approached the cat would leap upon them and destroy them. Paul always thought a lot of Nina for exterminating the wolves at Camp 9."

When the ad campaign took hold other writers grabbed the idea of wild exaggerations and embellishments of stories. Dealers looked forward to a call from RRLC salesmen known as the "The Paul Bunyan Man". Books, poems, plays, and works of art – even an opera- appeared. Paul Bunyan celebrations, exhibitions statutes, and displays were put together over the years. Laughhead's drawing of Paul Bunyan is believed to be the first picture of Paul Bunyan printed. Laughhead's next Red River booklet "The Marvelous Exploits of Paul Bunyan" appeared in 1922 with 10,000 copies initially printed with 5,000 more to follow.

A version of "The Round River Drive" goes as follows: One of the most peculiar incidents of Paul's life concerns the

experience following the year of reversed winter, when all the ducks and geese flew backward and when it was light at night and dark in the daytime. This was the season Paul picked to move his camp to unfamiliar territory that he'd never logged before, which perhaps accounts for some of the things that happened. In the spring it was decided to send all the logs in one big raft down the river that flowed past the camp. Johnny Inkslinger was put in charge of the raft and started downriver with his crew. The 3rd week Johnny peered out and was astonished to note that they were passing a camp which was built on the same scale as Bunyan's. It took them an hour to pass it and for the next week, the men cudgeled their brains trying to figure out just who it might be. Then they drifted for another 2 weeks and again passed another camp similar to the one they'd passed before. The only difference was that the prune pits in front of the cookhouse door were piled twice as high as at the camp they'd passed before. Johnny's curiosity was so aroused that he stopped the raft and went ashore. When he entered the door of the cookhouse, he found the crew eating with Paul at the head of the table. It then developed that the camp had been situated on Round River, which flowed in a circle and had no outlet, and that the raft had simply been floating around and around, getting no place. To solve the problem, Paul had the cook, Sourdough Sam, put a lot of his self-rising dough into the river which caused it to swell its banks and overflow, creating a new outlet to the mill. One must use their imagination while hearing a Paul Bunyan adventure as "NO TALE IS TOO TALL FOR PAUL". Fraternally,







Information for Log & Tally

The winema Club was able to hold a November meeting as there was a window of opportunity in Covid virus restrictions. Nineteen members and two guests met at the Moose Lodge for a steak dinner. Members appreciated and enjoyed the first get together in several months.

Outgoing President, Ron Loveness, installed incoming officers; President, Jon Hawthorne; 1st Vice-President, Bob Anderson; 2nd Vice-President, Richard McCullough; Incoming Board Members, Tom Strunk, Bill Nelson and Dave Prewitt. The abbreviated ceremony included the timeless message first used by former Supreme Nine member, the late Bill Patterson about EVERYBODY, SOMEBODY, ANYBODY, AND NOBODY.....It goes: "There was an important job to be done and EVERYBODY was sure that SOMEBODY would do it. It has been reported in several of the Mythical Paul Bunyan episodes in Klamath Country involving floating logs down the Klamath River all the way to the Pacific Ocean. Ken Dunn won the \$50.00 drawing for paid up members in attendance. A Paul Bunyan Cartoon was circulated. The board of directors plans to meet to monitor ever changing Covid virus restrictions. If meetings can't be held, the plan is to put out a newsletter in the Bulletin to keep members informed.

The MV Alexander Arbuthnot would have originally been stationed at the Koondrook Wharf and would have been busy transporting timber from the Barmah Forest to the Arbuthnot Sawmill. These days, the MV Alexander Arbuthnot has been fully restored and is now based at the Port of Echuca.




"Pipe Cricket" Challenge and the Black Cat trophy in 2017
