* Local CFS members assist major fires. The Border Watch, March 20, highlighted a 19 strong support by South East CFS volunteers assiting serious Victorian blazes. SPECIAL MEETING OF THE CLUB, AND IT'S FUTURE, MONDAY APRIL 8th.

This was held at the SA Hotel **open only to members**. 9 Members attended and apologies were received with input to the club meeting. Those members at the meeting gave very good input, and the meeting was held in a fraternal way and feeling for our wonderful club.

Brian Stewart, JIV President, was at the Robe weekend and provided valuable input of the situation of JIV. Our relationship to the forest industries will however be part of general Club focus. It apparently was mooted that our Club host the 2021 JIV Convention but the meeting said a clear no, and commented upon funding and sponsorship today being impossible. The future of other JIV Clubs was updated by Brian Stewart. Where clubs might fold, an option being taken by some was to remain a member at large at HHI.

The future of Clubs and 'industry bodies' is in a different environment with many Clubs having to face the world as it is. Rotary and RSL, Lodges, sporting Clubs etc all face aging members and falling numbers, and attracting members and sponsors today, is very difficult.

Two matters need to be examined. One is the **Datatrax Device at the Hoo-Hoo Pavilion** running out in a little less than two years, whether we keep this, or scrap it, and discussion with the Council be an issue. Our **existence as an Incorporated Body will be checked.** Where a copy our constitution is unknown. Incorporation was probably in 1997, and limits liability of any Club to the limit of Club finances, and protects Club Members or the Club Board from any financial liability. It is not an insurance policy.

DINNER TO COMMEMORATE DOUG HOWICK, APRIL 6Th.

LOTS OF GOOD NEWS FOR OUR INDUSTRY.

The Gympie Particle Board Plant, closed by CHH will be re-opened by Laminex Industries, owned by Fletchers of New Zealand and will add other milling developments on site to grow timber production, and use Queensland plantation timber.

A pelletizing plant is proposed for an undisclosed site near Mount Gambier, having been in the pipeline for some time, and seems to now have secure funding.

The KCA Power generating plant was visited by MP's and highlighted as an example to follow, and that small plants can be funded at affordable cost. Mega power generating plants are not needed. Mt Gambier has ideal sites for similar, either gas or wood residue fired and is a very efficient use of energy from whatever is used as fuel/

A huge about wind generating plant has been proposed to be built over a pine forest by about 40+ metres, and expects no complaints from nearby residents.

Around Mount Gambier, and in nearby Victoria, our industry seems to be on the cusp of major investments, and good job generation.

GREAT NEW PAINTING AT THE RIDDOCH ART GALLERY. STOP PRESS. A small exhibition in the Edkins Gallery has a new painting of the Leg of Mutton Forest Reserve after flooding by rising water in 1886. By this time pine seedlings from here were planted at the Bluff near Glencoe and at Mt Butt and Mt McIntyre. This is an most historic painting and record of SA establishing the plantation forest industry. Open until Sunday 16th June, it adds truly new part of our industry's amazing history!

One recommends seeing this amazing new painting asap, which adds to earlier paintings of the site which show the site as it was earlier in its history. Art Galleries are really Art Museums and could lead to higher emphasis on our history and placing or industry in a higher regional status. For instance, should a Conference about our Industry was in the wind, these paintings and other records might be put on show for the visiting delegates.
